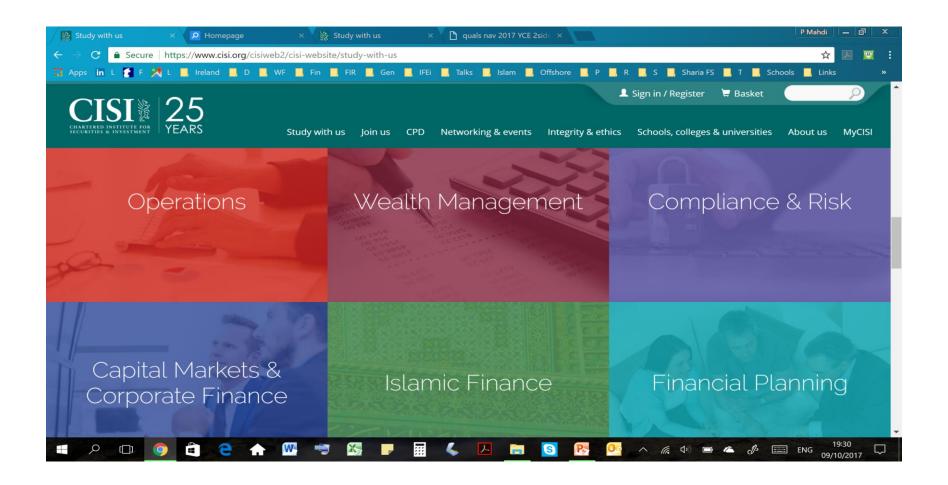

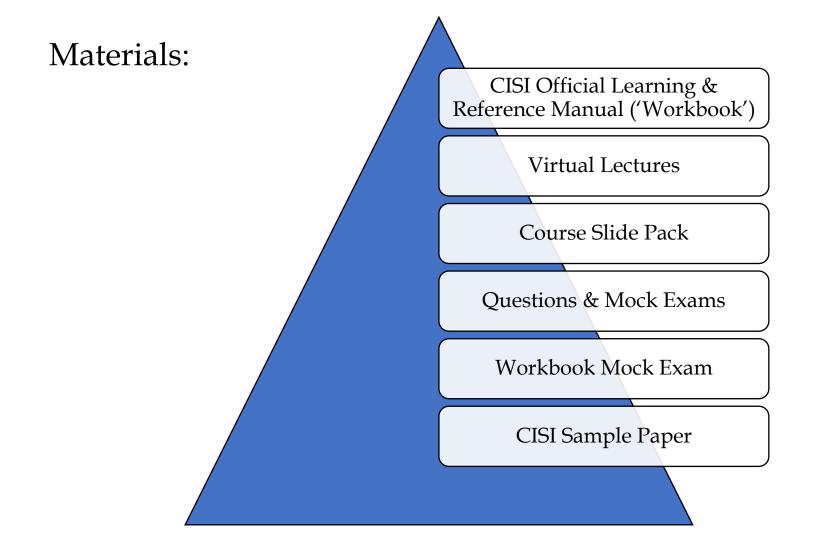

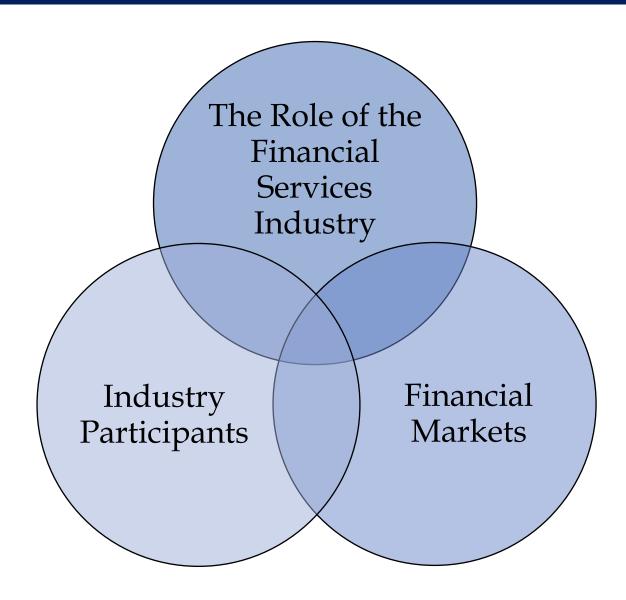

Allows risks to be managed effectively and efficiently through the use of insurance, and through sophisticated derivatives.

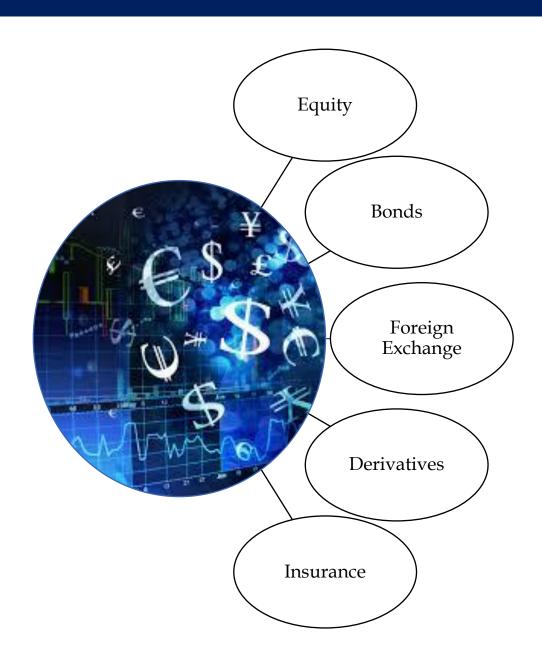
Payment Systems

Equity Markets

- Global market capitalisation was over **US\$109 trillion** as at the end of 2020
- The New York Stock Exchange (NYSE) US\$26 trillion
- National Association of Securities Dealers Automated Quotations system (NASDAQ) - US\$19 trillion
- Shanghai Stock Exchange (SSE) US\$7 trillion
- Tokyo Stock Exchange (TSE) US\$6 trillion
- In Europe, the largest exchanges are the London Stock Exchange (LSE), Euronext and Deutsche Börse.
- In the Middle East, **Tadawul** the Saudi Stock Exchange is the largest exchange with a domestic market capitalisation of close to **US\$2.5 billion**.

Equity Markets

Multilateral Trading Facilities (MTFs):

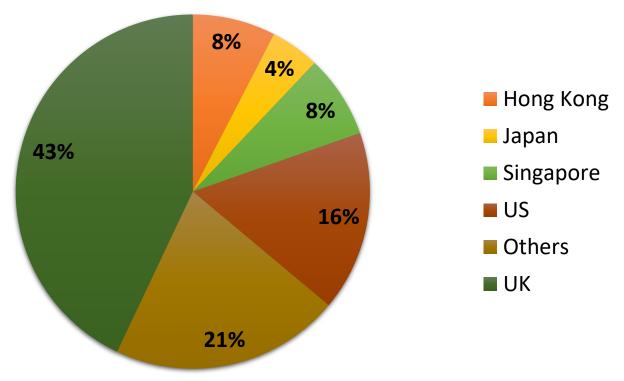
- Technology and communication networks
- Rivals to traditional stock exchanges
- These are trading systems that bring together multiple parties that are interested in buying and selling financial instruments, including shares, bonds and derivatives.

Bond Markets

- The amounts outstanding on the global bond market now exceed **US\$120** trillion.
 - **Domestic bonds 80%** of the total
 - International bonds 20% of the total
- Domestic bonds issued by companies and governments
- International bonds issued by companies, governments, and supranational agencies such as the World Bank.
- Governments are the largest issuers of bonds, followed by financial corporations.
- US has the largest bond market
- Trading in international bonds is predominantly undertaken in **European** markets.

Foreign Exchange

- Largest of all financial markets average daily turnover in excess of US\$5
 trillion
- Exchange rate determined by supply and demand
- The market is provided by the **major banks provide rates of exchange** at which they are willing to buy or sell currencies
- Historically, most FX deals were arranged over the telephone. Now, however, **electronic trading** is becoming increasingly prevalent.
- As FX is an **over-the-counter (OTC)** market: meaning one where brokers/dealers negotiate directly with one another.
- There is no central exchange or clearing house.

Derivatives Markets

- Trade a range of complex products based on underlying instruments, including currencies, indices, interest rates, equities, commodities and credit risk.
- Available on both the exchange-traded market and the OTC market
- Largest exchange-traded derivatives markets is the Chicago Mercantile Exchange (CME)
- Europe dominates trading in the OTC derivatives markets worldwide

Derivatives Markets

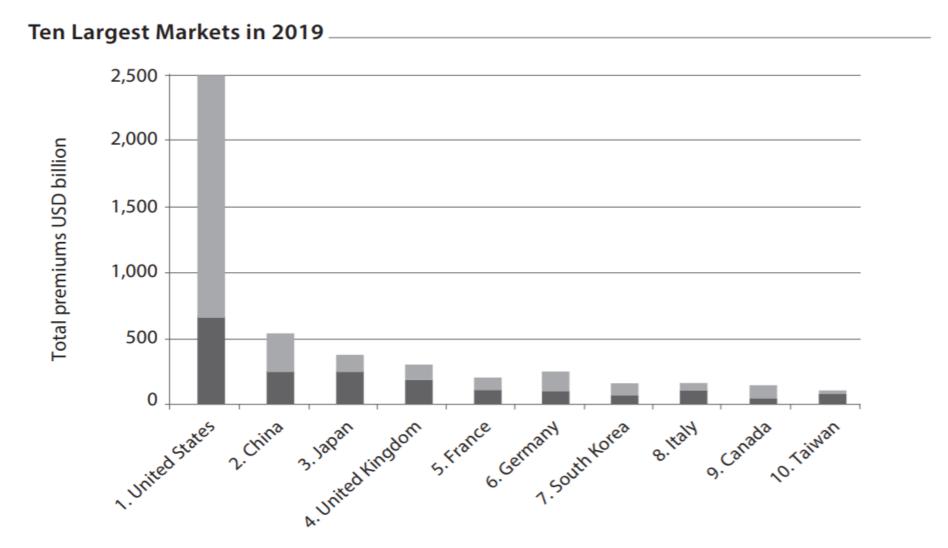
- OTC derivatives markets worldwide are about **four times** the size of stock quoted on stock exchanges.
- Interest rate derivatives contracts account for 80% of outstanding derivatives contracts, mostly through interest rate swaps
- The next largest segment is **FX derivatives (15%)**, which are used to speculate on currency movements and to hedge the risks of currency positions.
- Equity-linked contracts, credit derivatives and commodity contracts form the next major segments and these are used to hedge against risk or for speculation.

Insurance Markets

Specialise in the management of personal risk, corporate risk and protection of life events.

Globally, the US, Japan, China and the UK are the largest insurance markets, accounting for over 50% of worldwide premium income.

- Securities trading

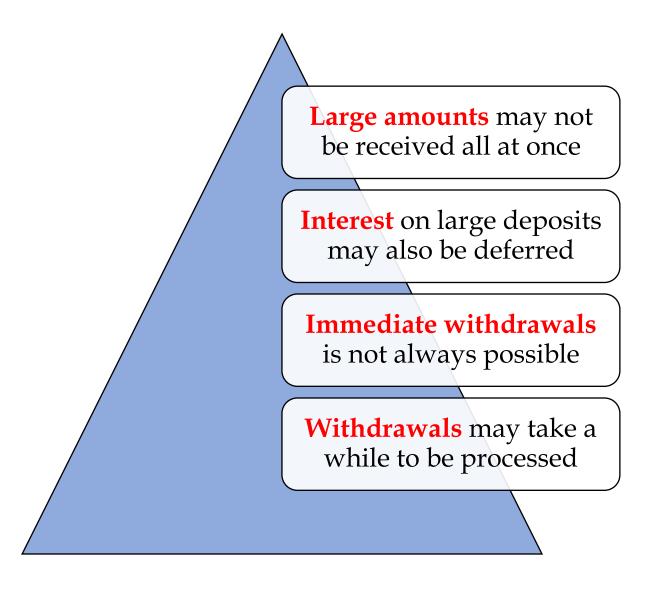


Peer-to-Peer Lending & Crowdfunding

Peer-to-peer lending and crowdfunding have emerged as **competitors to banks** as they may offer better rates to both borrowers and lenders.

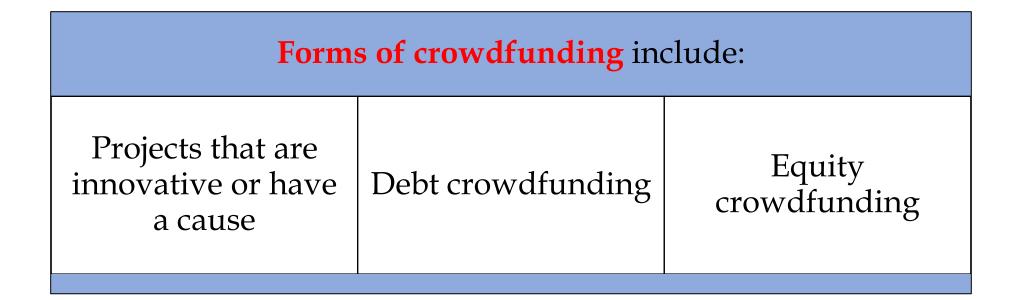
Peer-to-peer lending allows for a higher return in exchange for greater risk.

Crowdfunding

Businesses can reach out to multiple lenders and raise small amounts of money from each lender to fund their project/business.



Insurance Companies & Retirement Schemes

Insurance Companies

Allow risks to be managed effectively

Premium income is invested in **equities and bonds** - the insurance industry is a major investor in both equity and bond markets.

Retirement Schemes / Pensions

Traditionally, provided an amount based on the employee's final salary and number of years of service.

Most companies offer new staff defined contribution schemes.

Taken overall, retirement schemes are large, long-term investors in shares, bonds and cash.

Some also invest in physical assets like property.

Fund Managers

- Segmented between Institutional and Private Client
- Over US\$90 trillion of funds under management
- Also known as investment managers, portfolio managers or asset managers

Private Banks

- Tailored services to HNWIs
- Wider range of investment vehicles
- Integrated banking plus extra services
- Range of estate and tax planning services

International Private Banks

- Huge market dominated by Swiss Banks and Global Banks
- Services designed for ultrawealthy
- Able to offer individual specialist services because of size of investable funds

Wealth Managers

Services offered b

Execution-only stockbrokers

- Offer telephone or internet-based trade execution & settlement for retail clients.
- No advice is offered, and commission is charged per trade.
- They are aimed at day traders and investors.

Robo-advisers

- An online wealth management service that provides automated, **algorithm-based portfolio management advice** without the use of human financial planners.
- The robo-advisor typically charges a monthly or annual fee.

Advisory and discretionary wealth managers

- Offer a wealth management service to **private investors** either advice only or a fully managed (discretionary) service.
- Their target market ranges from mass affluent to high-net-worth clients.

Wealth Managers

Institutional brokers

- These are stockbrokers who arrange trades on **behalf of large institutions**.
- They can execute large trades in the market, without having a significant adverse effect on the share price.
- This may involve **breaking up a large order into smaller trades** and executing them through a variety of different trading venues.
- Institutional brokers usually charge basis point fees per trade.

Platforms

Platforms are online services used by intermediaries, such as **independent financial advisers (IFAs)**, to administer their clients' investment portfolios.

- Advisers can see and analyse a client's overall portfolio.
- Platforms arrange custody for clients' assets.
- Examples of platforms include those offered by **Cofunds** and **Hargreaves Lansdown**.
- 'Platform' refers to both wraps and fund supermarkets.
- Fund supermarkets tend to offer wide ranges of mutual funds
- Wraps offer greater access to other products such as **pension plans and insurance bonds**.
- Wrap accounts also provide a level of automation using internet tech.

Sovereign Wealth Funds

Emerged as major investors in the global markets over the last ten years

Private investment vehicles

- Have varied and undisclosed investment objectives
- Colossal funds under management
- Primary focus is on well **above average returns** from investments made abroad
- Size and global **diversification** allows them to participate in the best opportunities and spread their risks
- May also use part of their wealth as **reserve capital** for when their countries' natural resources are depleted

- It enables a firm to focus on the core areas of its business



Investment Distribution Channels

In financial markets, investment distribution channels consist of:

- **Financial Planning** meeting a client's **financial and lifestyle objectives** and needs
- <u>Financial Advisers</u> conducting a detailed analysis of a <u>client's financial</u> position and offer advice to meet their financial objectives
- Two main types
 - Independent advice
 - Restricted advice

Investment Distribution Channels

In financial markets, investment distribution channels consist of:

- Execution Only customers make their own decisions without advisory from the firm
 - The firm must state in writing:
 - 1) Gave **no advice**
 - 2) It is **not responsible** for the product suitablity
- <u>Robo-Advisors</u> Utilizing technology to offer financial advice to individual investors
